Dr. Erroll G. Southers is a Professor of the Practice of Governance, Director of the Safe Communities Institute and Director of Homegrown Violent Extremism Studies at the University of Southern California (USC) Sol Price School of Public Policy. He is also an adjunct subject matter expert for the RAND Corporation. Dr. Southers was President Barack Obama's first nominee for TSA Assistant Secretary and Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger's Deputy Director for Critical Infrastructure of the California Office of Homeland Security. He is a former FBI SWAT and undercover Special Agent, Assistant Chief of Homeland Security and Intelligence at the Los Angeles World Airports Police Department and Santa Monica Police Officer. As the author of Homegrown Violent Extremism, Dr. Southers earned his undergraduate degree from Brown University, and he holds masters and doctoral degrees in public policy from USC.



Michael German is a fellow with the Brennan Center for Justice's Liberty and National Security Program, where he focuses on law enforcement and intelligence oversight and reform. A sixteen-year veteran of federal law enforcement, Mr. German served as a special agent with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, where he specialized in domestic terrorism and covert operations. As an undercover agent, German twice infiltrated extremist groups using constitutionally sound law enforcement techniques. These operations successfully prevented terrorist attacks by winning criminal convictions against terrorists. He also served as a counterterrorism instructor at the FBI National Academy. There, he taught courses on extremism in democratic societies and developed a graduate-level training program for state, local and international law enforcement officers.



Nana Gyamfi, JD is a human rights and criminal defense attorney, the Vice Chairperson of Black Alliance for Just Immigration (BAJI), an adjunct professor in the Pan African Studies Department at the California State University Los Angeles, and an organizer and activist associated with various local, national, and international social justice causes. As a Movement attorney, Nana addresses the social justice challenges of Black and other marginalized communities of color through legal advocacy, organizing, and involvement in community causes. She represented all of the Black Lives Matter Los Angeles members prosecuted for protest actions from 2014 - 2016, and continues to advise activists involved in the Movement for Black Lives. Her almost twenty-five years of experience representing Black activists and organizers led her to co-found Justice Warriors 4 Black Lives, a Black collaborative project of community members fighting on the legal frontlines of Black liberation.
